


CASE STUDY GUIDE: SECONDARY SCHOOL (Age 11 - 16)

### **Case Study Summary**

This Case Study connects with our Lesson Plan: Sea Turtle Poaching. It focuses on our working to stop poaching of sea turtles in Mayotte.

This Case Study takes 15 minutes to complete.



### Subjects relevant to

English, Geography, History, Math, Science and Social Science.

### **Learning objectives**

- Learn about Mayotte and the sea turtle poaching taking place.
- > Learn about the work Sea Shepherd is doing to help protect sea turtles from poachers.

## **Preparation**

- This case study has been designed to supplement our main lessons It can be stopped at any time should you wish to include your own discussion/questions or incorporate the lesson activities.
- Depending on whether students are working in a classroom or remotely, you can choose to discuss questions in the class or use the online learning app.
- This digital lesson has an interactive option called student devices. If you choose this option ask the students to bring their mobile phones or tablets to the lesson.
- Should you choose the interactive option, it will run a quiz during the lesson. Recommendation: only use this interactive option in classes of up to 30 students.
- Students can sign up on their mobile device to the www.LessonUp.app. They will be asked
  for a PIN code (this will appear automatically on slide 3 and will also show at the bottom of
  the screen). Students who sign up under a false name may be removed by the teacher.
- Students who do not have a mobile device can join the quiz with another student.
- If student devices is turned ON, you can opt to turn the sound and the share screen ON or OFF. Further on you can choose if you want to 'show ranking after each quiz' question. Doing so will create a competitive element, but it can be distracting. Recommendation: turn the 'show ranking after each quiz' OFF.
- The abovementioned options will also show if you click on the PIN code at the bottom of the screen.

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### **Lesson plan**

#### Slide 1 Introduction

This lesson is provided by Sea Shepherd. Sea Shepherd was founded in 1977 and is a marine conservation organisation working to protect the oceans and marine wildlife. Sea Shepherd works globally on a range of issues impacting the oceans, running numerous direct action campaigns each year. IUU is one area Sea Shepherd is working on to help stop illegal fishing.



#### Slide 2 Lesson action icons

During the lesson we will use these icons to identify the learning actions.



#### Slide 3 Operation Nyamba

Operation Nyamba is protecting green sea turtles on the French Island of Mayotte, as they come ashore to nest. While the island is a protected marine reserve, turtles are killed for their meat. Sea Shepherd crew are patrolling the beaches at night to protect the turtles.

#### Slide 4 Mayotte

The map shows the location of Mayotte.

Mayotte is an island in the Indian Ocean, located between Madagascar and Mozambique, with an exceptional natural heritage. It is home to a protected marine reserve of 68,381km² with an exceptional but fragile biodiversity. The area is protected on paper only, due to a lack of means to guard it.



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#### **Slide 5 Nesting turtles**

To lay their eggs sea turtles return to the beach where they were born. They are then an easy prey for poachers who await them, armed with machetes.

After cutting off their flippers and head, they open the shells and take the meat, which is sold for up to 40 euros per kilo on the black market to wealthy members of the community. Their eggs, so precious for the next generation of turtles, are left to rot on the sand.

There are not enough guards to protect the turtles and access to the most dangerous beaches has been banned at night, due to the presence of poachers. The turtles are completely abandoned to their sad fate



#### Slide 6 Poachers

Officially, over 230 sea turtles were poached in Mayotte in 2016 and nearly 300 in 2015 poaching,

Sea Shepherd estimates, the real figure is closer to a thousand turtles killed.



The goal of this campaign is to deter poachers by our presence.

#### Slide 7 Local cooperation to protect sea turtles

Sea Shepherd is looking to work with local associations that do not have the means to act alone. We are in the process of establishing a network to help protect sea turtles.

The goal will then be to extend patrols throughout the year and to increase the number of secured beaches.

On Grande Terre, Sea Shepherd already patrol with local Mahorais teams. Turtle poaching is one of Mayotte's problems, but on a wider scale, poaching is also affecting the whole lagoon.
